# 3. I'm going to Central at 4:00

## subject + time + verb

In Cantonese, the modifier always comes before the one it modifies. Therefore, adverbials must come before the verb that it modifies.

If you want to change it into negative form, put the modifier "mh-haih" just before what you want to negate.

1. I am going to Central at 4:00

2. I am going to Central not at 4:00 (I go to Central at another time)

In Cantonese, "not go: mh heui", means that one does not want to go.

In Cantonese "not be go: mh haih heui", it's only a fact he doesn't go.

You can compare this with "I am not going: ngoh mh heui"

# **Part III Special sentences**

# Unit 10 jêung – sentences

The function of preposition "jēung" helps to bring the object in front of the verb.

The "jēung-sentences" indicates that an action is applied to somebody or something with the emphasis that the action will bring about a result or influence.

Moreover, the verb predicate of the "jēung-sentences" is usually followed by some other elements – aspect particles (jó, jyuh) or complements (laahn, yùhn, hái etc) to indicate the result or effect of the action. These elements are underlined in the following examples.

## 30. He made the toy broken

Emphasis on the result

In (a), the sentence is in a normal order "subject + verb + object", the intonation is more neutral.

In (b) the "j $\bar{e}$ ung-sentences" is used . The object is brought before the verb and it can emphasize the result.

### Unit 14 Reference: Elements of a sentence

There are 6 elements in a sentences:

## 1. Subject

The subject in a Cantonese sentence is the topic talked about.

## 2. Predicate

The predicate tells what is said about the subject

## 3. Object

The sentence element that is governed by a verb and denotes a person, thing or place that receives the actions of verb is called an object.

An object is usually placed after a verb.

#### 4. Attribute

The sentence element that modifies a noun or nominal phrase and expresses the quality, state, quantity or category of the person or thing modified is called an attribute.

#### 5. Adverbial

The sentence element that modifies a verb or an adjective by expressing its time, place, manner, scope, quality, state or degree is called an adverbial.

## 6. Complement

Complement is a supplementary or explanatory element, which is attached to a verb or an adjective.

It indicates how the action is going on, what its result is, how many times or how long it is done, or what degree or extent a quality or state of things reaches.
